- I. POWER TO RETAIN SINS (Acts 5:1-11)
 - A. The Corruption of a Greedy Couple (Acts 5:1-2)
 - i. Their covetousness (Acts 5:1-2)
 - 1. The sin of idolatry (Ephesians 5:3-5; Colossians 3:5)
 - 2. The tenth commandment (Exodus 20:17)
 - 3. The love of money (1 Timothy 6:10)
 - 4. Abhorred by God (Psalm 10:3; Luke 16:13-15)
 - 5. Opposite of contentment (Hebrews 13:5; 1 Timothy 6:5-10)
 - 6. Leads to hypocrisy (Ezekiel 33:31)

Ezekiel 33:31 And they come unto thee as the people cometh, and they sit before thee *as* my people, and they hear thy words, but they will not do them: for with their mouth they shew much love, *but* their heart goeth after their covetousness.

- 7. Leads to lying (2 Peter 2:3)
- ii. Their hypocrisy (Acts 5:2; Romans 12:9)
- iii. Their dishonesty (Acts 5:2; Romans 12:17)
- B. Their Condemnation by the Apostle Peter (Acts 5:3-4)
 - They lied to the Holy Ghost (Acts 5:3; Isaiah 63:10)
 - 1. Note: The Holy Ghost can be:
 - a) Lied to (Acts 5:3)
 - b) Tempted (Acts 5:9)
 - c) Grieved (Ephesians 4:30)
 - d) Quenched (1 Thessalonians 5:19)
 - e) Rebelled against (Isaiah 63:10)
 - f) Resisted (Acts 7:51)
 - ii. They sinned against God (Acts 5:4; Psalm 51:4)
 - iii. Note: The Holy Ghost and God are one and the same. (Acts 5:3, 4)
 - 1. They lied to the Holy Ghost (Acts 5:3)
 - 2. They lied to God (Acts 5:4)

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- C. The Carrying Away of the Lying Saints (Acts 5:5-10)
 - i. The death and burial of Ananias (Acts 5:5-6)
 - ii. The death and burial of Sapphira (Acts 5:7-10)

Note: The power of the apostles to remit or retain sins (John 20:19-23) is seen in the book of Acts. The sins of Ananias and Sapphira were retained. The sins of Simon were remitted (Acts 8:18-24).

 - i. Brought into the streets (Acts 5:15)

 - iv. Present day healing –(Apostolic power replaced by word and prayer)
 - 1. Trophimus was left sick (2 Timothy 4:20)

- III. POWER TO ESCAPE SENTECING (Acts 5:17-24)
 - A. The Sect of the Sadducees (Acts 5:17-18)
 - i. Filled with indignation (Acts 5:17; Acts 4:1-2)
 - 1. Defined: "indignation"
 - a. From Scripture:

- i. Associated with violence (Jeremiah 50:25)
- ii. Associated with anger (Esther 5:9; Psalm 69:24; Isaiah 30:27, 30; Lamentations 2:6)
- iii. Associated with a pouring action (Ezekiel 21:31)
- b. From history:
 - i. "Indignation" "from Old French 'fury, rage; disrespect, ' 'noun of action....regard as unworthy, be angry or displeased at." – from: www.etymonline.com
- 2. At what was preached
- ii. Laid hands on the apostles (Acts 5:18)
- B. The Angel of the Lord (Acts 5:19-20)
 - i. Granted freedom (Acts 5:19; Acts 12:7)
 - ii. Gave commands (Acts 5:20)
 - 1. Go
 - 2. Stand
 - 3. Speak
 - iii. Revealing His (God's) will (Acts 5:20) (Knowing God's will)
 - 1. Word (Psalm 119:105; 2 Timothy 3:16)
 - 2. Prayer (Jeremiah 10:23, 24; Colossians 1:9)

Jeremiah 10:23 O LORD, I know that the way of man *is* not in himself: *it is* **not** in man that walketh **to direct his steps**. **24** O LORD, correct me, but with judgment; not in thine anger, lest thou bring me to nothing.

3. Obedience (Romans 12:1, 2; Proverbs 3:5, 6)

Proverbs 3:5 Trust in the LORD with all thine heart; and **lean not** unto thine **own understanding**. **6** In **all** thy **ways acknowledge him**, and **he** shall **direct thy paths**.

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IV. POWER TO PROCLAIM THE SAVIOUR (Acts 5:25-32)

- A. Brought Before the Council (Acts 5:25-28)
 - i. Found in the temple (Acts 5:25, 20)
 - ii. Brought without violence (Acts 5:26; Acts 4:21; Luke 20:19)
 - iii. Questioned concerning their doctrine (Acts 5:27-28; 1 Peter 3:15)
 - 1. Its illegality (Acts 4:18)
 - 2. Its saturation (Acts 17:8) "they have turned the world upside down"
 - 3. Its incrimination (Acts 5:33; Acts 7:54; Romans 3:19)

Acts 7:54 When they heard these things, they were **cut to the heart**, and they gnashed on him with *their* teeth.

Romans 3:19 Now we know that what things soever the law saith, it saith to them who are under the law: that every mouth may be stopped, and all the world may become guilty before God.

- V. POWER TO SUFFER SHAME (Acts 5:33-42)
 - A. The Reaction of the Council (Acts 5:33)
 - i. Conviction
 - ii. Condemnation
 - B. The Advice of the Doctor (Acts 5:34-39) –quite probable that this is the same Gamaliel that taught Saul (Paul) (Acts 22:3)
 - i. Caution (Acts 5:34-35)
 - ii. Consideration (Acts 5:36-37)
 - iii. Constraint (Acts 5:38-39)

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- C. The Faith of the Apostles (Acts 5:40-42)
 - i. Receiving (Acts 5:40; 2 Timothy 3:12)
 - 1. A beating
 - 2. A warning
 - ii. Rejoicing (Acts 5:41; 1 Peter 2:20-21; 2 Corinthians 12:9-10)
 - 1. That they were counted worthy
 - 2. That they could suffer shame
 - 3. Suffering for the cause of Christ:
 - a. The godly shall suffer (2 Timothy 3:12)
 - b. Appointed to suffer (1 Thessalonians 3:3, 4)
 - c. Called to suffer (1 Peter 2:20, 21)
- **1 Peter 2:20** For what glory *is it*, if, when ye be buffeted for your faults, ye shall take it patiently? but if, when ye do well, and suffer *for it*, ye take it patiently, this *is* acceptable with God. **21** For even hereunto were ye called: because **Christ** also **suffered for us**, leaving us an example, that ye should **follow his steps**:
 - d. To glory in suffering (2 Corinthians 12:9, 10)
- 2 Corinthians 12:9 And he said unto me, My grace is sufficient for thee: for my strength is made perfect in weakness. Most gladly therefore will I rather glory in my infirmities, that the power of Christ may rest upon me. 10 Therefore I take pleasure in infirmities, in reproaches, in necessities, in persecutions, in distresses for Christ's sake: for when I am weak, then am I strong.
 - e. To reign because of suffering (Romans 8:17; 2 Timothy 2:12)

Romans 8:17 And if children, then heirs; heirs of God, and joint-heirs with Christ; if so be that **we suffer** with *him*, that we may be also **glorified together**.

- **2 Timothy 2:12** If we **suffer**, we shall **also reign with** *him*: if we deny *him*, he also will deny us:
 - iii. Reaching (Acts 5:42)
 - 1. To every house (Acts 20:20)
 - 2. Without ceasing (Acts 20:31)
