Deuteronomy II Release and Sacrifice Deuteronomy 15:1-23

 - i. Instruction
 - ii. Compassion
 - iii. Admonishment
- B. Usage of Words
 - i. "thou"
 - I. Used thirty-two (32 x) times in twenty (20) verses (Deuteronomy 15:1; Deuteronomy 15:3; Deuteronomy 15:5; Deuteronomy 15:6; Deuteronomy 15:7; Deuteronomy 15:8; Deuteronomy 15:9; Deuteronomy 15:10; Deuteronomy 15:11; Deuteronomy 15:12; Deuteronomy 15:13; Deuteronomy 15:14; Deuteronomy 15:15; Deuteronomy 15:17; Deuteronomy 15:18; Deuteronomy 15:19; Deuteronomy 15:20; Deuteronomy 15:21; Deuteronomy 15:22; Deuteronomy 15; 23)
 - II. Used to refer to the Children of Israel in the chapter.
 - ii. "thy"
 - I. Used thirty-five (35 x) times in seventeen (17) verses (Deuteronomy 15:3; Deuteronomy 15:4; Deuteronomy 15:5; Deuteronomy 15:6; Deuteronomy 15:7; Deuteronomy 15:9; Deuteronomy 15:10; Deuteronomy 15:11; Deuteronomy 15:12; Deuteronomy 15:14; Deuteronomy 15:15; Deuteronomy 15:17; Deuteronomy 15:18; Deuteronomy 15:19; Deuteronomy 15:20; Deuteronomy 15:21; Deuteronomy 15:22)
 - II. Used in the possessive sense, referring to the Children of Israel.
- C. Usage of Phrases
 - i. "Thou shalt"
 - Used seventeen (17 x) times in thirteen (13) verses (Deuteronomy 15:1;
 Deuteronomy 15:6; Deuteronomy 15:8; Deuteronomy 15:10;
 Deuteronomy 15:11; Deuteronomy 15:12; Deuteronomy 15:14;
 Deuteronomy 15:15; Deuteronomy 15:17; Deuteronomy 15:19;
 Deuteronomy 15:20; Deuteronomy 15:22; Deuteronomy 15:23)
 - II. Used to admonish the Children of Israel to take great care of their actions.

- ii. "Thou shalt not"
 - I. Used five (5 x) times in five (5) verses (Deuteronomy 15:6; Deuteronomy 15:7; Deuteronomy 15:13; Deuteronomy 15:21; Deuteronomy 23)
 - II. Used to admonish the Children of Israel to take great care of their actions.
- II. THE LORD'S RELEASE (Deuteronomy 15:1-5; 7-11)
 - A. The Manner of the Release (Deuteronomy 15:1-2; 7-11)
 - i. To be done at the end of every seven years
 - ii. Every creditor that lended to his neighbor was to release it
 - I. He was to not exact it of his neighbor
 - II. Or his brother
 - III. Because it was the Lord's release (Deuteronomy 15:2)
 - iii. For the poor that was among them (Deuteronomy 15:3-4; 7-11)
 - I. The lending to be done without usury (Exodus 22:25)
 - a. *Usury* = "practice of lending money at interest"
 - b. Was permitted for the stranger, but not a fellow Israelite (Deuteronomy 32:19-20)
 - II. It appears that this may only have applied to the poor
 - III. Not to the wealthy
 - IV. Notice verse four of Deuteronomy 15 (Deuteronomy 15:4)
 - a. This is a continuation of verse three where it says, "but that which is thine with thy brother thine hand shall release;"
 - b. Verse four:
 - "Save when there shall be no poor among you"
 - V. Notice verses seven through eleven in Deuteronomy 15 (Deuteronomy 15:7-14)
 - a. To give without a hard heart (Deuteronomy 15:7)
 - b. Commanded to lend sufficiently (Deuteronomy 15:8)
 - c. Not to withhold from the poor (Deuteronomy 15:9)
 - d. To be done with the right spirit (Deuteronomy 15:10)
 - e. To open their hand wide (Deuteronomy 15:11)
 - B. The Exceptions to the Release (Deuteronomy 15:3-4)
 - i. Permitted to exact it again in the year if it was a foreigner
 - ii. Not permitted if it were a brother/Israelite
 - iii. When there was no poor among them
 - C. Comments on How This Was Observed
 - i. Some "scholars" have claimed that this release was only good for the 7th year and that the debtor would begin to pay the remaining debt again the following year.

- ii. While this may be true, if you look at the chapter (Deuteronomy 15) as a whole you notice that the release of the servant mentioned later was a permanent occurrence. (Deuteronomy 15:12-14)
- D. Compared to The Lord's Deliverance By Jesus Christ
 - i. The seventh year release
 - I. In many respects it was a year of mercy to the poor
 - II. The name given here is "The Lord's release"
 - ii. It finds a higher "type/connection" to the "acceptable year of the Lord" (Luke 4:19) A true "Lord's release"
 - I. The Lord came unto His own and gave them relief and offered Himself (Luke 4:17-18)
 - a. The Lord preached unto the poor
 - b. Healed those that were brokenhearted
 - c. Healed those that were blind (both physically and spiritually)
 - d. And set at liberty those that were bruised
 - II. He also came for the Church and came to save those that were lost
 - a. At the appointed time Christ came (2 Corinthians 5:19)
 - b. It was an accepted time (2 Corinthians 6:2)
 - c. It is a time of forgiveness to those who believe a "Lord's release", not from a monetary debt, but a spiritual debt (2 Corinthians 5:21; 1 Peter 2:24), not temporary, but eternal.
 - d. It is a time of setting free of those that have been "bondsmen" to Satan and the flesh (Romans 6:18)
- E. The Careful Observance of the Commandments (Deuteronomy 15:5)
 - i. Told to carefully hearken unto the voice of the LORD
 - ii. To do ALL of these commandments

III. THE PROMISE OF BLESSINGS FROM GOD (Deuteronomy 15:6)

- A. To Lend Unto Other Nations
 - i. The Lord would make them to prosper (Deuteronomy 28:12)
 - ii. The Lord would make them the head over all others (Deuteronomy 28:13)
 - I. They saw this to some extent during the reign of Solomon (1 Kings 4:21, 24)
 - II. This will be truly fulfilled during the Millennial reign of Christ.
- B. Not to Borrow From Other Nations
 - i. The borrower is servant unto the lender (Proverbs 22:7)
 - ii. In the history of nations you see this illustrated today.

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IV. THE COMMANDMENTS FOR LENDING UNTO THE POOR (Deuteronomy 15:7-11)

- A. To Be Done Liberally (Deuteronomy 15:7-8)
 - i. To be done without a hard heart
 - ii. To be done with an open hand (Proverbs 22:9)
 - iii. To not be done with usury (Leviticus 25:35-36)
- B. To Be Done with the Right Spirit (Deuteronomy 15:9-11)
 - i. Paul charged those that were rich to have the right kind of heart and to give without grudging (1 Timothy 6:17-18)
 - ii. When it is in thy hand to do it (1 John 3:16-17)
 - iii. God is well pleased (Hebrews 13:16)
