How to Study the Bible

The Study of a Topic

I. THE STUDY OF A SUBJECT

- A. Occurrence in Scripture (Identify all synonyms and include them.)
 - 1. Find every occurrence of this subject in scripture.
 - 2. Use *Treasury of Scripture Knowledge* to find other verses that are related to your subject, but might not use the exact word that you are studying.
 - 3. Divide the occurrences by section of the Bible.
 - a. Is this subject emphasized in one section of the Bible over others?
 - b. Is this subject totally ignored in some sections of the Bible?
 - c. Is this subject covered in every section of the Bible?
 - 4. Is there a chapter in the Bible that focuses on this subject?

B. Connotation in Scripture

- 1. Does the subject you are studying have an evil connotation?
 - a. Is this evil connotation limited to certain people, places, or things?
 - b. Is this evil connotation consistent throughout scripture?
- 2. Does the subject that you are studying have a good connotation?
 - a. Is this good connotation limited to certain people, places, or things?
 - b. Is this good connotation consistent throughout scripture?

C. Comparison or Contrast in Scripture

- 1. To what other things is your subject likened?
 - a. Covetousness is often likened to idolatry.
 - b. Anger is often likened to fire.
 - c. Death is often likened to sleep.
- 2. With what other things is your subject contrasted?
 - a. God's righteousness is often contrasted with man's righteousness.
 - b. God's greatness is often contrasted with man's lowliness.
 - c. The life of the wicked is contrasted with the life of the righteous.

D. Define the Subject

- 1. Once you have read every occurrence of the subject within its context, make a general definition of the subject. If possible, make a specific definition, but do not do so to the detriment of the scriptural use.
- 2. Allow the scriptural connotation and the comparison or contrast of your subject to shape your definition.
- 3. Does your definition match the standard teaching of this subject? If not, what scriptures lead you to go against the standard teaching?

- 4. Is the word used in more than one primary way (i.e., ark)?
- 5. Divide the occurrences by sections of the Bible.
 - a. Is this object emphasized in one section of the Bible over the others?
 - b. Is this object totally ignored in some sections of the Bible?
 - c. Is this object covered in every section of the Bible?
- 6. Is there a chapter in the Bible that focuses on this object?
- 7. Is this object tied to a specific people, place, or time?

- 1. Does the object that you are studying have an evil connotation?
- 2. Does the object that you are studying have a good connotation?
- 3. Does the object that you are studying have a neutral connotation?

C. Comparison or Contrast in Scripture

- 1. To what other things is your object likened?
- 2. With what other things is your object contrasted?

- 1. Are there any Bible teachings or customs associated with this object?
- 2. What adjectives are used to describe this object?
- 3. What characteristics of this object can be seen in the scriptures?
- 4. How does the Bible use this object to illustrate truth?
